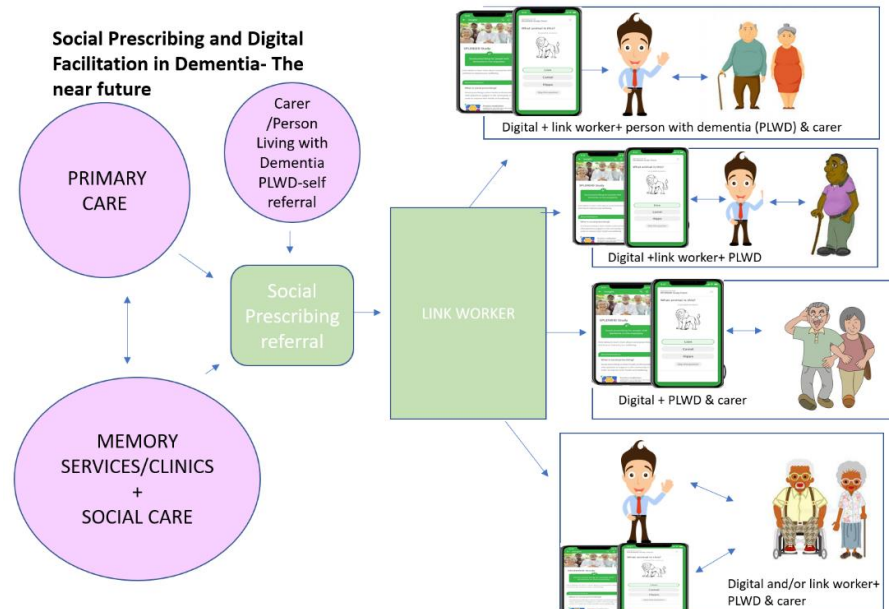

CHAIR: Professor Chris Fox, Professor of Clinical Psychiatry, Norwich Medical School, University of East Anglia

CHRIS FOX is a Professor of Clinical Psychiatry and works in NHS dementia services. He leads three national research programmes in community and hospital care for people with dementia with a focus on improving care for people with memory problems and supporting carers. He was clinical advisor on the arts and humanities research council funded mark making project which explored the role of the participative arts for people with dementia in the UK. He is leading innovation in digital and blended approaches in caregiver health and social prescribing in people affected by memory loss.



I just want to finish on one slide, showing how digital systems help the journey of social prescription, and look at how we can supercharge engaging with the arts as well. There are a lot of options, it is not just about arts, there are various activities. There is lot of information, and technology and digital is good at processing that information. One of the ideas moving forward at the moment is to give the SPLW additional facilitation, and the patient, through some shared web portal, digital access. You don't rely on these things but they're there if you need them. It can act as a directory, but also have self-help tips. This is something that is planning to be worked up in the next three to five years and evaluated and developed. I'm reaching out to the community. If anyone is interested in finding out more we would welcome that, as we are linked to the National Academy and the SP Network and we're

focusing on people with dementia and memory problems to assist with the pathway.

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
